Safety Section 1-1

GENERAL SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS AND PRACTICES

A careful operator is the best operator. Safety is of primary importance to the manufacturer and should be to the owner/operator. Most accidents can be avoided by being aware of your equipment, your surroundings, and observing certain precautions. The first section of this manual includes a list of Safety Messages that, if followed, will help protect the operator and bystanders from injury or death. Read and understand these Safety Messages before assembling, operating or servicing this Implement. This equipment should only be operated by those persons who have read the manual, who are responsible and trained, and who know how to do so responsibly.



The Safety Alert Symbol combined with a Signal Word, as seen below, is used throughout this manual and on decals which are attached to the equipment. The Safety Alert Symbol means: "ATTENTION! BECOME ALERT! YOUR SAFETY IS INVOLVED!" The Symbol and Signal Word are intended to warn the owner/operator of impending hazards and the degree of possible injury faced when operating this equipment.

Practice all usual and customary safe working precautions and above all---remember safety is up to YOU. Only YOU can prevent serious injury or death from unsafe practices.



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Safety Section 1-2

A DANGER	Never operate the Tractor or Implement until you have read and completely understand this Manual, the Tractor Operator's Manual, and each of the Safety Messages found in the Manual or on the Tractor and implement. Learn how to stop the tractor engine suddenly in an emergency. Never allow inexperienced or untrained personnel to operate the Tractor or Implement without supervision. Make sure the operator has fully read and understood the manuals prior to operation. (SG-4)str
A WARN IN G	Always maintain the safety signs in good readable condition. If the safety signs are missing, damaged, or unreadable, obtain and install replacement safety signs immediately. (SG-5)str
A WARN IN G	Make certain that the "Slow Moving Vehicle" (SMV) sign is installed in such a way as to be clearly visible and legible. When transporting the Equipment use the Tractor flashing warning lights and follow all local traffic regulations. (SG-6)str
A WARN IN G	Operate this Equipment only with a Tractor equipped with an approved roll-over- protective system (ROPS). Always wear seat belts. Death or serious injury could result from falling off the tractor, particularly during a turnover when the operator could be pinned under the ROPS. (SG-7) str
A WARN IN G	Do not modify or alter this Implement. Do not permit anyone to modify or alter this Implement, any of its components or any Implement function. (SG-8)str
A DANGER	BEFORE leaving the tractor seat lower the implement, set the parking brake and/or set the tractor transmission in parking gear, disengage the PTO, stop the engine, remove the key, and wait for all moving parts to stop. Place the tractor shift lever into a low range or parking gear to prevent the tractor from rolling. Never dismount a Tractor that is moving or while the engine is running. Operate the Tractor controls from the tractor seat only. (SG-9)str
A DANGER	Never allow children or other persons to ride on the Tractor or Implement. Falling off can result in death or serious injury. <i>(SG-10)str</i>

SAFETY



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ACAUTION PROLONGED EXPOSURE TO LOUD NOISE MAY CAUSE PERMANENT HEARING LOSS! Tractors with or without an Implement attached can often be noisy enough to cause permanent hearing loss. We recommend that you always wear hearing protection if the noise in the Operator's position exceeds 80db. Noise over 85db over an extended period of time will cause severe hearing loss. Noise over 90db adjacent to the Operator over an extended period of time will cause permanent or total hearing loss.

NOTE: Hearing loss from loud noise [from tractors, chain saws, radios, and other such sources close to the ear] is cumulative over a lifetime without hope of natural recovery. (SG-I7)str

AWARNING Transport only at speeds where you can maintain control of the equipment. Serious accidents and injuries can result from operating this equipment at high speeds. Understand the Tractor and Implement and how it handles

before transporting on streets and highways. Make sure the Tractor steering and brakes are in good condition and operate properly.

Before transporting the Tractor and Implement, determine the proper transport speeds for you and the equipment. Make sure you abide by the following rules:

Test the tractor at a slow speed and increase the speed slowly. Apply the Brakes smoothly to determine the stopping characteristics of the Tractor and Implement. As you increase the speed of the Tractor the stopping distance increases. Determine the maximum transport speed not to exceed 20 mph (30 kph) for transporting this equipment.

Test the equipment at a slow speed in turns. Increase the speed through the turn only after you determine that the equipment can be operated at a higher speed. Use extreme care and reduce your speed when turning sharply to prevent the tractor and implement from turning over. Determine the maximum turning speed for you and this equipment before operating on roads or uneven ground.

Only transport the Tractor and Implement at the speeds which allow you to properly control the equipment.

Be aware of the operating conditions. Do not operate the Tractor with weak or faulty brakes or worn tires. When operating down a hill or on wet or rain slick roads, the braking distance increases: use extreme care and reduce your speed. When operating in traffic always use the Tractor's flashing warning lights and reduce your speed. Be aware of traffic around you and watch out for the other guy. (SG-19)str

AWARNING Never attempt to lubricate, adjust, or remove material from the Implement while it is in motion or while tractor engine is running. (SG-20)str





SAFETY				
A DANGER	Operate the Tractor and/or Implement controls only while properly seated in the Tractor seat with the seat belt securely fastened around you. Inadvertent movement of the Tractor or Implement may cause death or serious injury. (SG-29)str			
AWARN IN G	Be particularly careful when transporting the Implement with the Tractor. Turn curves or go up hills only at a low speed and using a gradual steering angle. Rear mounted implements move the center of gravity to the rear and remove weight from the front wheels. Make certain, by adding front ballast, that at least 20% of the tractor's weight is on the front wheels to prevent rearing up, loss of steering control or Tractor tip-over. Slow down on rough or uneven surfaces to prevent loss of steering control which could result in property damage or possible injury. Do not transport unless 3-Point lift lever is fully raised and in the latched transport position. Dropping implement in transport can cause serious damage to the tractor and/or Implement and possibly cause the operator or others to be killed or injured. (s3PT-02)str			
A WARN IN G	Relieve hydraulic pressure prior to doing any maintenance or repair work on the Implement. Place the Implement on the ground or securely blocked up, disengage the PTO, and turn off the tractor engine. Push and pull the Remote Cylinder lever in and out several times prior to starting any maintenance or repair work. (S3PT-09)str			
A DANGER	This Implement may be wider than the Tractor. Be careful when operating or transporting this equipment to prevent the Implement from running into or striking sign posts, guard rails, concrete abutments or other solid objects. Such an impact could cause the Implement and Tractor to pivot violently resulting in loss of steering control, death, or serious injury. Never allow the Implement to contact obstacles. (S3PT-12)str			
A DANGER	There are obvious and hidden potential hazards in operating Rear Blades and Box Scrapers as in all power-driven equipment. REMEMBER! This machine is often operated in rough terrain conditions that include gullies, holes, slopes, hidden obstructions and the like. Death or serious injury may occur unless care is taken to assure the personal safety of the operator and bystanders in the area. (SBL-1)str			
A DANGER	NEVER PARK BLADE ON THE BACK OF THE MOLDBOARD. Inadvertent falling could cause death or serious injury. ALWAYS LOWER HITCH onto stand or onto secure blocks. (SBL-2)str			
A DANGER	Never leave blade unattended in the lifted position. Accidental operation of lifting lever or a hydraulic failure may cause sudden drop of unit with subsequent death or injury by crushing. Lower Stand and pin in place, or put a secure support under the A-Frame. Lower Blade carefully to the ground. Do not put hands or feet under lifted components. (SBL-4)str







SAFETY

FEDERAL LAWS AND REGULATIONS

This section is intended to explain in broad terms the concept and effect of federal laws and regulations concerning employer and employee equipment operators. This section is not intended as a legal interpretation of the law and should not be considered as such.

Employer-Employee Operator Regulations

U.S. Public Law 91-596 (The Williams-Steiger Occupational and Health Act of 1970) OSHA

This Act Seeks:

"...to assure so far as possible every working man and woman in the nation safe and healthful working conditions and to preserve our human resources..."

DUTIES

Sec. 5 (a) Each employer-

(1) shall furnish to each of his employees employment and a place of employment which are free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm to his employees;

(2) shall comply with occupational safety and health standards promulgated under this Act.

(b) Each employee shall comply with occupational safety and health standards and all rules, regulations

and orders issued pursuant to this Act which are applicable to his own actions and conduct.

OSHA Training Requirements

Title 29, Code of Federal Regulations Part 1928.57(a)(6). www.osha.gov

Operator instructions. At the time of initial assignment and at least annually thereafter, the employer shall instruct every employee who operates an agricultural tractor and implements in the safe operating practices and servicing of equipment with which they are or will be involved, and of any other practices dictated by the work environment.

Keep all guards in place when the machine is in operation.

Permit no riders on equipment.

Stop engine, disconnect the power source, and wait for all machine movement to stop before servicing, adjusting, cleaning or unclogging the equipment, except where the machine must be running to be properly serviced or maintained, in which case the employer shall instruct employees as to all steps and procedures which are necessary to safely service or maintain the equipment.

Make sure everyone is clear of machinery before starting the engine, engaging power, or operating the machine.

Employer Responsibilities:

To ensure employee safety during Tractor and Implement operation, it is the employer's responsibility to:

- 1. Train the employee in the proper and safe operation of the Tractor and Implement.
- 2. Require that the employee read and fully understand the Tractor and Implement Operator's Manual.
- 3. Permit only qualified and properly trained employees to operate the Tractor and Implement.
- 4. Maintain the Tractor and Implement in a safe operational condition and maintain all shields and guards on the equipment.
- 5. Ensure the Tractor is equipped with a functional ROPS and seat belt and require that the employee operator securely fasten the safety belt and operate with the ROPS in the raised position at all times.
- 6. Forbid the employee operator to carry additional riders on the Tractor or Implement.
- 7. Provide the required tools to maintain the Tractor and Implement in a good safe working condition and provide the necessary support devices to secure the equipment safely while performing repairs and service.
- 8. Require that the employee operator stop operation if bystanders or passersby come within 300 feet.

Child Labor Under 16 Years of Age

Some regulations specify that no one under the age of 16 may operate power machinery. It is your responsibility to know what these regulations are in your own area or situation. (Refer to U.S. Dept. of Labor,

Employment Standard Administration, Wage & Home Division, Child Labor Bulletin #102.)

INTRODUCTION

This Crowning Grader is designed with care and built with quality materials by skilled workers. Proper assembly, maintenance, and operating practices, as described in this manual, will help the owner/operator get years of satisfactory service from the machine.

The purpose of this manual is to familiarize and instruct. The Assembly Section instructs the owner/operator in the correct assembly of the Blade using standard and optional equipment.



NOTE: All references made in this manual to right, left, front, rear, top or bottom are as viewed facing the direction of forward travel with implement properly attached to tractor.

The Crowning Grader Blade is an attachment that mounts to a skid steer loader or small utility tractor with 3-Point capabilities. It is designed to level, contour, and grade gravel and dirt surfaces, including roadways and dirt ditches and field/yard surfaces.

NOTE: The specific term "Crowning Grader" will be referred to simply as "grader" throughout the rest of this manual. The term skid steer loader or small utility tractor will be referred to as "machine" at times throughout this manual

Carefully read the Operator's Manual completely, understand the Safety Messages and instructions, and know how to operate correctly both the tractor and Blade. Ultimately it is our desire that you will be operating your grader as a seasoned professional in very little time.

ATTENTION OWNER/OPERATOR

Bush Hog warrants to the original purchaser of any new Bush Hog equipment, purchased from an authorized Bush Hog dealer, that the equipment be free from defects in material and workmanship for a period of one (1) year for non-commercial, state and municipalities' use and ninety (90) days for commercial use from date of retail sale. The obligation of Bush Hog to the purchaser under this warranty is limited to the repair or replacement of defective parts.

Replacement or repair parts installed in the equipment covered by this limited warranty are warranted for ninety (90) days from the date of purchase of such part or to the expiration of the applicable new equipment warranty period, whichever occurs later. Warranted parts shall be provided at no cost to the user at an authorized Bush Hog dealer during regular working hours. Bush Hog reserves the right to inspect any equipment or parts which are claimed to have been defective in material or workmanship.

DISCLAIMER OF IMPLIED WARRANTIES & CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES

Bush Hog's obligation under this limited warranty, to the extent allowed by law, is in lieu of all warranties, implied or expressed, **INCLUDING IMPLIED WARRANTIES OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE** and any liability for incidental and consequential damages with respect to the sale or use of the items warranted. Such incidental and consequential damages shall include but not be limited to: transportation charges other than normal freight charges; cost of installation other than cost approved by Bush Hog; duty; taxes; charges for normal service or adjustment; loss of crops or any other loss of income; rental of substitute equipment, expenses due to loss, damage, detention or delay in the delivery of equipment or parts resulting from acts beyond the control of Bush Hog.


The BHCG84 Road Graders are shipped completely assembled from the factory.

In addition to the safety messages contained in this manual, safety signs are affixed to the implement and tractor. If any part of the operation and safe use of this equipment is not completely understood, consult an authorized dealer for a complete explanation.


If the operator cannot read the manuals for themselves or does not completely understand the operation of the equipment, it is the responsibility of the supervisor to read and explain the manuals, safety practices, and operating instructions to the operator.

Safe operation of equipment requires that the operator wear approved Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) for the job conditions when attaching, operating, servicing, and repairing the equipment. PPE is designed to provide operator protection and includes the following safety wear:

PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT (PPE)

- Always Wear Safety Glasses (with side shields marked to comply with ANSI Z87)
- Hard Hat
- Steel Toe Safety Footwear
- Gloves
- Hearing Protection
- Close Fitting Clothing
- Respirator or Filter Mask (depends on operating conditions)

DANGER DO NOT use drugs or alcohol immediately before or while operating the Tractor and Implement. Drugs and alcohol will affect an operator's alertness and coordination and therefore affect the operator's ability to operate the equipment safely. Before operating the Tractor or Implement, an operator on prescription or over-the-counter medication must consult a medical professional regarding any side effects of the medication that would hinder their ability to operate the Equipment safely. NEVER knowingly allow anyone to operate this equipment when their alertness or coordination is impaired. Serious injury or death to the operator or others could result if the operator is under the influence of drugs or alcohol. (SG-27) str

3. TRACTOR REQUIREMENTS

Operating the grader with a tractor that does not meet the following requirements may cause tractor or implement damage and be a potential danger to the operator and passersby.

Tractor Requirements and Capabilities

- Certified approved Roll-Over Protective Structure (ROPS) or ROPS cab and seat belt.
- Tractor Safety Devices Slow Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblem, lighting, PTO master shield
- Tractor Horsepower...... Max 72 PTO HP-4 Wheel Drive & 90 PTO HP 2 Wheel Drive
- Hitch 3 Point Hitch..... CAT I, CAT 2N, CAT 1 Quick Hitch
- Front End Weights...... As needed to maintain 20% weight on front axle

3.1 ROPS and Seat Belt

The tractor must be equipped with a Roll-Over-Protective-Structure (ROPS), tractor cab, or roll-bar and seat belt to protect the operator from falling off the tractor, especially during a roll over where the driver could be crushed and killed. Only operate the tractor with the ROPS in the raised position and seat belt fastened. Tractor models not equipped with a ROPS and seat belt should have these life saving features installed by an authorized dealer. OPS-U- 0003str

AWARNING

Operate this Equipment only with a Tractor equipped with an approved roll-overprotective system (ROPS). Always wear seat belts. Death or serious injury could result from falling off the tractor, particularly during a turnover when the operator could be pinned under the ROPS. (SG-7) str



3.2 Tractor Horsepower

The power required to operate these implements is determined by the tractor PTO horsepower. For most operating conditions, the Road Graders require a tractor with the maximum of 72 PTO HP- 4 wheel drive and 90 PTO HP for 2 wheel drive. Operating these implements with a tractor that does not have adequate power may damage the tractor engine. Exceeding the recommended horsepower may cause road grader damage by overpowering the unit in heavy operating conditions.


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3.3 Tractor 3-Point Hitch

The tractor's 3-point hitch must be rated to lift at least 1000 lbs.

The BHCG84 can attach to tractors with a CAT I or II hitch. Refer to the tractor operator's manual for the category of the tractor used. If the hitch does not conform to the ASAE CAT I or CATII dimensions, the blade may not fit or raise properly. Consult an authorized dealer for possible modification procedures to mount nonconforming hitches.

Use the correct hitch pins for the hitch category being used. For a Cat I hitch, 7/8" lower and 3/4" upper diameter hitch pin are used and Cat II hitches require 1-1/8" lower and a 1" upper diameter hitch pin.

3.4 Front End Weight

A minimum of 20% total tractor weight must be maintained on the tractor front end at all times. Front end weight is critical to maintain steering control and to prevent the tractor from rearing up while driving. If the front end is too light, add weight until a minimum of 20% total weight is reached on the front tires. Front weights and weight carriers can be purchased through an authorized tractor dealership. OPS-U-0005 str

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4. GETTING ON AND OFF THE TRACTOR

Before getting onto the tractor, the operator must read and completely understand the implement and tractor operator manuals. If any part of either manual is not completely understood, consult an authorized dealer for a complete explanation. OPS-U- 0007str

AWARNING

Do not mount or dismount the Tractor while the tractor is moving. Mount the Tractor only when the Tractor and all moving parts are completely stopped. Dismounting a moving power unit can result in a crushing hazard that can cause death or serious injury. (*SG-12*) *str*



4.1 Boarding the Tractor

Use both hands and equipped handrails and steps for support when boarding the tractor. Never use control levers for support when mounting the tractor. Seat yourself in the operator's seat and secure the seat belt around you.

Never allow passengers to ride on the tractor or attached equipment. Riders can easily fall off and be seriously injured or killed from falling off and being ran over. It is the operator's responsibility to forbid all extra riders at all times. *OPS-U- 0008str*

A DANGER Never allow children to operate, ride on, or come close to the Tractor or Implement. Usually, 16-17 year-old children who are mature and responsible can operate the implement with adult supervision, if they have read and understand the Operator's Manuals, been trained in proper operation of the tractor and Implement, and are physically large enough to reach and operate the controls easily. (*SG-11)* str




Never allow children or other persons to ride on the Tractor or Implement. Falling off can result in death or serious injury. (SG-10)str

4.2 Dismounting the Tractor


Before dismounting, park the tractor and implement on a reasonably level surface, apply the parking brake, idle the engine down, disengage the PTO, and lower the implement to the ground. Shut down the tractor engine according to the operator's manual, remove the key, and wait for all motion to completely stop. Never leave the seat until the tractor, its engine and all moving parts have come to a complete stop.

Use hand rails and steps when exiting the tractor. Be careful of your step and use extra caution when mud, ice, snow or other matter has accumulated on the steps or hand rails. Use all handrails and steps for support and never rush or jump off the tractor. *OPS-U- 0009 str*

DANGER BEFORE leaving the tractor seat lower the implement, set the parking brake and/or set the tractor transmission in parking gear, disengage the PTO, stop the engine, remove the key, and wait for all moving parts to stop. Place the tractor shift lever into a low range or parking gear to prevent the tractor from rolling. Never dismount a Tractor that is moving or while the engine is running. Operate the Tractor controls from the tractor seat only. (SG-9)str



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5. STARTING THE TRACTOR

The operator must have a complete understanding of the placement, function, and operational use of all tractor controls before starting the tractor. Review the tractor operator's manual and consult an authorized dealer for tractor operation instructions if needed.

Essential Tractor Controls:

- · Locate the light control switch
- Locate the engine shut off control
- Locate the brake pedals and the clutch
- · Locate the PTO control
- Locate the 3-point hitch control lever
- · Locate the hydraulic remote control levers

Before starting the tractor ensure the following:

- Conduct all pre-start operation inspection and service according to the tractor operator's manual.
- Make sure all guards, shields, and other safety devices are securely in place.
- The parking brake is on.
- The PTO control lever is disengaged.
- The 3-point hitch control lever is in the lowered position.
- The hydraulic remote control levers are in the neutral position.
- The tractor transmission levers are in park or neutral.

Refer to the tractor owner's manual for tractor starting procedures. Only start the tractor while seated and belted in the tractor operator's seat. Never bypass the ignition switch by short circuiting the starter solenoid. After the tractor engine is running, avoid accidental contact with the tractor transmission to prevent sudden and unexpected tractor movement. OPS-U-0028str

DANGER Never run the Tractor engine in a closed building or without adequate ventilation. The exhaust fumes can be hazardous to your health. (SG-23) str

🛕 DANGER

Start tractor only when properly seated in the Tractor seat. Starting a tractor in gear can result in death or serious injury. Read the Tractor operators manual for proper starting instructions. (SG-13) str

6. CONNECTING THE IMPLEMENT TO THE TRACTOR


Use extreme caution when connecting the implements to the tractor. The implement should be securely resting at ground level or setting on blocks. Keep hands and feet from under the units and clear of pinch points between the tractor hitch arms and implement pins. *OPS-0011_B str*



Always shut the Tractor completely down, place the transmission in park, and set the parking brake before you or anyone else attempts to connect or disconnect the Implement and Tractor hitches. (S3PT-15) str

6.1 Connecting to the Tractor

- 1. Shorten or remove the tractor drawbar to avoid interference when raising and lowering the road grader
- 2. Board the tractor and start the engine. Position the tractor to the road grader with the 3-point lift arms positioned between the respective set of road grader A-frame lift lugs. **Note:** Set the 3-point lift control to "Position Control" so that the lift arms maintain a constant height when attaching the road grader or rake. See the tractor Operator's Manual for correct settings when attaching 3point equipment.
- 3. Turn off the tractor engine, set the parking brake, place the tractor in park, and dismount.
- 4. One lift arm at a time, align arm end hole between the set of holes of A-frame lift lugs. Insert hitch pin through the lug and arm holes and insert retaining pin into hitch pin. Walk around to opposite side and repeat procedure for remaining lift arm and hitch pin.
- 5. Extend or retract the 3-point top link to align its end hole with the holes of the road grader top link. Insert the top link pin and retain.
- 6. On the tractor lift arms, adjust any lower link check chains, guide blocks, or sway blocks to prevent the road grader or rake from swaying side to side and possible contact with tractor rear tires.

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7. CONNECTING TO SKID STEER LOADER




A crushing hazard exists when hooking-up attachments. DO NOT allow anyone to stand between the Skid Steer/Tractor and the attachment itself. DO NOT operate hydraulic controls while someone is near the Skid Steer/Tractor or attachment.

7.1 Hook-Up with Skid Steer Style Hitch

🛦 DANGER

Make sure Skid Steer Hitch Plate is properly attached to the grader forks. It must be secured under the top angle bar and locking handles must be locked down with locking pins extending fully through the bottom slots. If improperly attached it can fall resulting in death or serious injury.

- 1. If needed, pull locking handles up on the Skid Steer hitch plate until locking pins are raised up and ready for hook-up.
- 2. Carefully drive up to the Grader making sure the hitch plate on the Skid Steer arms are parallel with the Grader hitch plate.
- 3. Rotate top of Skid Steer tilt arms slightly forward.
- 4. Place top of Skid Steer hitch plate under the top angled bar on the bucket.
- 5. Slowly lift Skid Steer hitch up until top angle bar and Grader hitch plate have come together.
- 6. Rotate top of Skid Steer hitch plate back to align bottom slots in the Grader with locking pins in the Skid Steer hitch plate.
- 7. Push lock handles on Skid Steer hitch down so that the pins go through the bottom slots of the Grader hitch plate and handles lock down.

8. PRE-OPERATION INSPECTION AND SERVICE

Before each use, a pre-operation inspection and service of the implement and tractor must be performed. This includes routine maintenance and scheduled lubrication, inspecting that all safety devices are equipped and functional, and performing needed repairs. DO NOT operate the unit if the pre-operation inspection reveals any condition affecting safe operation. Perform repairs and replacement of damaged and missing parts as soon as noticed. By performing a thorough pre-operation inspection and service, valuable down time and repair cost can be avoided. OPS-U-0029str

Periodically inspect all moving parts for wear and replace when necessary with authorized service parts. Look for loose fasteners, worn or broken parts, and leaky or loose fittings. Make sure all pins have cotter pins and washers. Serious injury may occur from not maintaining this machine in good working order. (SG-21)str





8.1 Tractor Pre-Operation Inspection/Service

Refer to the tractor operator's manual to ensure a complete pre-operation inspection and scheduled service is performed according to the manufacturer's recommendations. The following are some of the items that require daily service and inspection:

- Tire condition/air pressure .
- Wheel lug bolts •
- Steering linkage •
- PTO shield
- SMV sign is clean and visible
- Tractor's lights are clean and functional
- Tractor Seat belt is in good condition •
- ROPS is in the raised position
- No tractor oil leaks •
- Radiator free of debris
- Engine oil level and condition
- Engine coolant level and condition
- Power brake fluid level
- Power steering fluid level
- Fuel condition and level
- Sufficient lubrication at all lube points
- Air filter condition OPS-U-0030 str

8.2 Blade Pre-Operation Inspection/Service

AWARNING

Before each use, a complete inspection and service is required to ensure the blade is in good and safe working condition. Damaged and/or broken parts should be repaired and/or replaced immediately. To ensure the blade is ready for operation, conduct the following. *OPS- 0020_C str*

Periodically inspect all moving parts for wear and replace when necessary with authorized service parts. Look for loose fasteners, worn or broken parts, and leaky or loose fittings. Make sure all pins have cotter pins and washers. Serious injury may occur from not maintaining this machine in good working order. (SG-21)str





The operator's manual and safety signs affixed on the unit contain important instructions on the safe and proper use of the equipment. Maintain these important safety features on the implement in good condition to ensure the information is available to the operator at all times.

- Ensure the manual canister is secured to the equipment with the operator's manual inside.
- Ensure all safety signs are in place and legible. Replace missing, damaged, and illegible decals. *OPS-U- 0011 str*


9.BLADE ADJUSTMENT

The Crowning Grader works best when the roadway material is relatively loose before leveling or grading begins. The grader is designed to create a crown in the middle of the road or move the berm material on the side of the road back into the center, Built-in ripper teeth are used to loosen packed material prior to grading.

NOTE: The ripper teeth and the blade should not be used at the same time.

9.1 Standard Blade Adjustment

The grader is equipped with depth indicators, lefthand and right-hand, to show the height of the blade relative to the skid shoes.





Left-Hand - "Grade Height" Adjustment (0 through 4)

Right-Hand - "Grade Height" Adjustment (+1 through -2)

9.2 Below Grade Blade Adjustment

Depending on the roadway surface condition (adequate loose material or base does not have enough cover material), grading works best by starting with the blade set lower than the skid shoes,

To set the blade below the skid plate on the lefthand side:

- 1. Place the grader skid plates on blocks.
- 2. Use the auxiliary hydraulics at low idle, to raise the spacer off the cylinder body.
- 3. Remove the cylinder spacer and store it in a safe place.
- 4. Using the auxiliary hydraulics lower the grader blade to the desired depth.
- 5. Raise the grader and remove the blocks.
- 6. Follow the Level Grading or the Crown Grading procedure.

9.3 Level Grading

Whenever grading loose material be aware of the possibility of mounding or humping. This condition occurs whenever the grader is loading up and emptying. The goal is to load up the blade with material and keep it consistently full.

It may be necessary to raise the grader off of the skid plates at certain times to prevent waves or ripples.

If the grader overfills with loose material, either raise the grader blade or back drag the material back into place.


For level grading:

- 1. Make sure the grader skid plates are level to the ground.
- 2. Set left and right-hand sides of the cutting blade to the same height. Start somewhere between 0" and +1".
- 3. It may be necessary to raise the grader slightly off the ground to make the adjustments. Before making any adjustments. place blocks under the skid plates and lower the grader on the blocks.

AWARNING Before leaving the operator's seat, make sure the engine is stopped, the transmission is placed in park, the key is removed, and the parking brake is set.

- 4. Under normal circumstances, place the loader hydraulics in the "float" position to allow the skid plates to follow the ground, If there is no float position available, attempt to keep the skid plates flat on the ground.
- 5. The grader can also be dragged backwards for a level and more consistent finish.
- 6. Once the grading is complete, the roadway material should be packed into place. Packing is important to prevent the surface material from quickly being moved, resulting in ripples, waves, or tire channels.

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9.4 Crowning

The goal of crowning a roadway is to allow rainwater to flow off of both sides of the roadway. Allowing a buildup of water creates the opportunity for puddles that develop into potholes.

It is common for gravel roadways to have berms of gravel on each edge. The grader can be used to redistribute this loose material back into the center of the roadway. If the soil content of the berm is too high, it can be easily graded farther from the edge of the roadway.

When working on a curve, bank the roadway in the direction of travel and do not crown the surface.

- 1. Make sure the grader skid plates are level to the ground.
- 2. Set the right-hand side lower than the left-hand side and allow material to flow to the left, toward the center of the roadway. The indicator marks are set for 1 inch spacing.
- 3. If the right-hand side of the cutting blade is set to -1 or -2, the grader will need to be lifted off the ground.
 - Raise the grader slightly off the ground and place blocks under the skid plates. Lower the grader onto the blocks.
 - Once the blade is set, remove the blocks.
- 4. Under normal circumstances, place the loader hydraulics in the "float" position to allow the skid plates to follow the ground. If there is no float position available, attempt to keep the skid plates flat on the ground.
- 5. The grader can also be dragged backwards for a level and more consistent finish.
- 6. Once the grading is complete, the roadway material should be packed into place. Packing is important to prevent the surface material from quickly being moved, resulting in ripples, waves, or tire channels.

9.5 Setting Ripper Teeth Depth

The ripper teeth can be used whenever the roadway surface is too hard for the grader blade to move the material. Also, use the ripper teeth when there is not enough loose material above base to uniformly grade the surface.

The ripper teeth should also be used whenever potholes are present. To restore a consistent surface, it is important to disturb or cut into the roadway material deeper than the depth of the pothole. It may take several passes for deeper potholes. If the pothole goes deeper than the topping surface, a spot disturbance is recommended in order to avoid disturbing roadway base material.

The unique design of the grader allows the ripper teeth to be set at different heights depending on roadway surface conditions. The thirteen ripper teeth can be independently set to one of three setting: 1", 2", or 3". When power or traction is limited, use few ripping teeth.

NOTICE


Do not use the ripper teeth and grader blade in the same pass.

1. Lower the teeth to a depth that loosens the surface material but leaves the base in place.



Setting for 1" Depth







Setting for 3" Depth

- 2. Set left and right-hand sides of the cutting blade to 0".
- 3. Set the ripper teeth to a depth of 1" to 2" depending on the hardness of the roadway surface,
- 4. Loosen the top layer of the entire area to be graded. The ripper teeth are spaced 6" apart, so several passes will be required.

NOTICE

Do not lower the ripper teeth too deeply on the first pass. Damage to the grader can result in using excessive force to loosen packed materials.

- 5. If potholes are deeper than the ripper teeth are set, lower the teeth and spot rip those areas so as to avoid disturbing the base in solid areas.
- 6. Before grading, raise the teeth into the storage position.

10. DRIVING THE TRACTOR AND IMPLEMENT

Safe tractor transport requires the operator possess a thorough knowledge of the model being operated and precautions to take while driving with an attached implement. Ensure the tractor has the capacity to handle the weight of the implement and the tractor operating controls are set for safe transport. To ensure safety while driving the tractor with an attached implement, review the following. OPS-U- 0012str

This Implement may be wider than the Tractor. Be careful when operating or transporting this equipment to prevent the Implement from running into or striking sign posts, guard rails, concrete abutments or other solid objects. Such an impact could cause the Implement and Tractor to pivot violently resulting in loss of steering control, death, or serious injury. Never allow the Implement to contact obstacles. (S3PT-12)str

AWARNING Transport only at speeds where you can maintain control of the equipment. Serious accidents and injuries can result from operating this equipment at high speeds. Understand the Tractor and Implement and how it handles

before transporting on streets and highways. Make sure the Tractor steering and brakes are in good condition and operate properly.

Before transporting the Tractor and Implement, determine the proper transport speeds for you and the equipment. Make sure you abide by the following rules:

Test the tractor at a slow speed and increase the speed slowly. Apply the Brakes smoothly to determine the stopping characteristics of the Tractor and Implement. As you increase the speed of the Tractor the stopping distance increases. Determine the maximum transport speed not to exceed 20 mph (30 kph) for transporting this equipment.

Test the equipment at a slow speed in turns. Increase the speed through the turn only after you determine that the equipment can be operated at a higher speed. Use extreme care and reduce your speed when turning sharply to prevent the tractor and implement from turning over. Determine the maximum turning speed for you and this equipment before operating on roads or uneven ground.

Only transport the Tractor and Implement at the speeds which allow you to properly control the equipment.

Be aware of the operating conditions. Do not operate the Tractor with weak or faulty brakes or worn tires. When operating down a hill or on wet or rain slick roads, the braking distance increases: use extreme care and reduce your speed. When operating in traffic always use the Tractor's flashing warning lights and reduce your speed. Be aware of traffic around you and watch out for the other guy. (SG-19)str

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OPERATION

10.1 Starting the Tractor


The procedure to start the tractor is model specific. Refer to the tractor operator's manual for starting procedures for your particular tractor. Consult an authorized dealer if the starting procedure is unclear. Ensure the 3-point control lever is in the lowered position and the PTO is disengaged before starting the tractor. OPS-U-0033str



10.2 Brake and Differential Lock Setting

Make sure the tractor brakes are in good operating condition. Tractor brakes can be set to operate independently allowing single rear wheel braking action or locked together to provide simultaneous rear wheel braking. FOR MOST DRIVING AND OPERATING CONDITIONS, THE BRAKE PEDALS SHOULD BE LOCKED TOGETHER TO PROVIDE THE MOST EFFECTIVE BRAKING ACTION.

Always disengage the tractor differential lock when turning. When engaged the differential lock will prevent or limit the tractor from turning. During normal cutting conditions, locking the differential provides no benefit and should not be used.



AWARNING

Be aware of the operating conditions. Do not operate the Tractor with weak or faulty brakes. When operating down a hill or on wet or rain slick roads, the braking distance increases. Use extreme care and reduce your speed in these conditions. When operating in traffic, always use the Tractor's flashing warning lights and reduce your speed. Be aware of traffic around you and watch out for the other guy. *OPS-U- 0013 str*

10.3 Driving the Tractor and Implement

Start off driving at a slow speed and gradually increase your speed while maintaining complete control of the tractor and unit. Moving slowly at first will also prevent the tractor from rearing up and loss of steering control. The tractor should never be operated at speeds that cannot be safely handled or which will prevent the operator from stopping quickly during an emergency. If the power steering or engine ceases operating, stop the tractor immediately as the tractor will be difficult to control.

Perform turns with the tractor and units at slow speeds to determine how the tractor with an attached blade handles a turn. Determine the safe speed to maintain proper control of the tractor when making turns. When turning with a towed implement, the overall working length of the unit is increased. Allow additional clearance for the units when turning.

To avoid overturns, drive the tractor with care and at safe speeds, especially when operating over rough ground, crossing ditches or slopes, and turning corners. Tractor wheel tread spacing should be increased when working on inclines or rough ground to reduce the possibility of tipping.

Use extreme caution when operating on steep slopes. Keep the tractor in a low gear when going downhill. DO NOT coast or free-wheel downhill.

11.OPERATING THE TRACTOR AND IMPLEMENT

THE OPERATOR MUST COMPLETELY UNDERSTAND HOW TO OPERATE THE TRACTOR AND IMPLEMENT AND ALL CONTROLS BEFORE ATTEMPTING TO OPERATE.

The operator must read and understand the Safety and Operation Sections of the implement and tractor operator's manuals. These manuals must be read and explained to any operator who cannot read. Never allow someone to operate the implement and tractor without complete operating instructions.

Before starting any operation, the operator must become familiar with the area to be worked in and any obstacles and hazards contained within to ensure safety to the operator, bystanders, and equipment. Special attention should be paid to foreign debris, rough terrain, steep slopes, and passersby and animals in the area. *OPS-U- 0015 str*

11.1 Operating the Grader

When operating the Road Grader, a reasonable degree of care should be taken to avoid large obstacles that would create undue loads on both the grader and linkage which could result in damage to your unit. Use "Float Position" while operating unit. Do not use down pressure. Always operate at a slow speed.

11.2 Backfilling and Snow Removal

The backfilling operation should be performed with the load in the center of the road grader. Avoid concentrated loads on end of the road grader. <u>DO NOT</u> ram into a load at any time, as this multiplies the force several times above normal and could result in damage to your road grader. Perform all backfilling operations at slow speeds to prevent damage if road grader hits an object.

Moving snow with the road grader in backfill position is a very delicate operation and should be performed with extreme care and very slow speed. It is very easy to hit objects hidden in snow, or hit a snow bank that is too much material for your road grader to move. This could damage your road grader or mainframe. Caution in snow removal should be taken, as tractor could lose and regain traction causing surge in ground speed.


In all backfilling operations, the top link setting is very critical. Lengthen the top link so the road grader is tilted down at the rear in order that the road grader moves across the ground, not digging into it.

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12.SHUTTING DOWN THE IMPLEMENT

To shut down the implement, first bring the tractor to a complete stop.

Park the tractor on a level surface, place the transmission in park or neutral and apply the parking brake, lower the attached implement to the ground, shut down the engine, remove the key, before exiting the tractor.



13.DISCONNECTING THE BLADE FROM THE TRACTOR

Before disconnecting the blade, all movement must cease. Move the blade to a level storage location and lower the unit to the ground. If the blade is not resting securely on the ground, block the blade up securely before attempting to disconnect it from the tractor.

Use extreme care to keep feet and hands from under the blade and clear of any pinch points. OPS- 0051_Astr

Always shut the Tractor completely down, place the transmission in park, and set the parking brake before you or anyone else attempts to connect or disconnect the Implement and Tractor hitches. (S3PT-15) str

When disconnecting the road grader the tractor should be completely shut down and secured in position, by lowering the road grader. Relieve hydraulic pressure by moving the control levers back and forth several times. Then extend the tractor 3-point hitch top link to remove tension on the top link hitch pin. When the pin is loose and easy to rotate, remove the pin from the road grader. Next remove both lower hitch pins.

14. ROAD GRADER AND STORAGE

Properly preparing and storing the implement at the end of the season is critical to maintaining its appearance and to help ensure years of dependable service. The following are suggested storage procedures:

- Thoroughly clean all debris off the unit to prevent damage from rotting grass and standing water.
- Lubricate all grease points as detailed in the maintenance section.
- Tighten all bolts and pins to the recommended torque.
- Check the unit for worn and damaged parts. Perform repairs and make replacements immediately so that the unit will be ready for use at the start of the next season.
- Store the unit in a clean, dry place with the implement resting securely on blocks or at ground level.
- Use spray touch-up enamel where necessary to prevent rust and maintain the appearance of the unit.

DANGER Never allow children to play on or around Tractor or Implement. Children can slip or fall off the Equipment and be killed or injured. Inadvertent contact with controls can cause the Implement to shift or fall crushing themselves or others. (SG-25) str

Raise Ripper Teeth off the ground while being stored.

OPERATION

15. TRANSPORTING THE TRACTOR AND IMPLEMENT

Inherent hazards of operating the tractor and implement and the possibility of accidents are not left behind when you finish working in an area. Therefore, the operator must employ good judgment and safe operation practices when transporting the tractor and implement between locations. By using good judgment and following safe transport procedures, the possibility of accidents while moving between locations can be substantially minimized. *OPS-U- 0017str*

16.DRIVING THE TRACTOR AND IMPLEMENT

Safe tractor transport requires the operator possess a thorough knowledge of the model being operated and precautions to take while driving with an attached implement. Ensure the tractor has the capacity to handle the weight of the implement and the tractor operating controls are set for safe transport. To ensure safety while driving the tractor with an attached implement, review the following. OPS-U- 0012str

This Implement may be wider than the Tractor. Be careful when operating or transporting this equipment to prevent the Implement from running into or striking sign posts, guard rails, concrete abutments or other solid objects. Such an impact could cause the Implement and Tractor to pivot violently resulting in loss of steering control, death, or serious injury. Never allow the Implement to contact obstacles. (S3PT-12)str

AWARNING

Transport only at speeds where you can maintain control of the equipment. Serious accidents and injuries can result from operating this equipment at high speeds. Understand the Tractor and Implement and how it handles

before transporting on streets and highways. Make sure the Tractor steering and brakes are in good condition and operate properly.

Before transporting the Tractor and Implement, determine the proper transport speeds for you and the equipment. Make sure you abide by the following rules:

Test the tractor at a slow speed and increase the speed slowly. Apply the Brakes smoothly to determine the stopping characteristics of the Tractor and Implement. As you increase the speed of the Tractor the stopping distance increases. Determine the maximum transport speed not to exceed 20 mph (30 kph) for transporting this equipment.

Test the equipment at a slow speed in turns. Increase the speed through the turn only after you determine that the equipment can be operated at a higher speed. Use extreme care and reduce your speed when turning sharply to prevent the tractor and implement from turning over. Determine the maximum turning speed for you and this equipment before operating on roads or uneven ground.

Only transport the Tractor and Implement at the speeds which allow you to properly control the equipment.

Be aware of the operating conditions. Do not operate the Tractor with weak or faulty brakes or worn tires. When operating down a hill or on wet or rain slick roads, the braking distance increases: use extreme care and reduce your speed. When operating in traffic always use the Tractor's flashing warning lights and reduce your speed. Be aware of traffic around you and watch out for the other guy. (SG-19)str

DANGER Never allow children or other persons to ride on the Tractor or Implement. Falling off can result in death or serious injury. *(SG-10)str*



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Before transporting the tractor on a public roadway or boarding a trailer for transport, the tractor brake pedals should be locked together. Locking the pedals ensures that both wheels brake simultaneously while stopping, especially when making an emergency stop.

Use extreme caution and avoid hard applications of the tractor brakes when towing heavy loads at road speeds. Never tow the implement at speeds greater than 20 MPH (32 kph). *OPS-U- 0018 str*



16.1 Transporting on Public Roadways

Extreme caution should be used when transporting the tractor and implement on public roadways. The tractor must be equipped with all required safety warning features including a SMV emblem and flashing warning lights to alert drivers of the tractor's presence. Remember that roadways are primarily designed for automotive drivers and most drivers will not be looking out for you, therefore, you must look out for them. Check your side view mirrors frequently and remember that vehicles will approach quickly because of the tractor's slower speed. Be extremely cautious when the piece of equipment that you are towing is wider than the tractor tire width and/or extends beyond your lane of the road. OPS-BL-0003str



Only tow the Implement behind a properly sized and equipped Tractor which exceeds the weight of the Implement by at least 20%. DO NOT tow the Implement behind a truck or other type of vehicle. Never tow the Implement and another Implement connected in tandem. Never tow the Implement at speeds over 20 MPH. (STI-06)str



A DANGER

Never allow children or other persons to ride on the Tractor or Implement. Falling off can result in death or serious injury. (SG-10)str



AWARNING

Make certain that the "Slow Moving Vehicle" (SMV) sign is installed in such a way as to be clearly visible and legible. When transporting the Equipment use the Tractor flashing warning lights and follow all local traffic regulations. (SG-6)str



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The SMV (Slow-Moving Vehicle) emblem is universal symbol used to alert drivers of the presence of equipment traveling on roadways at a slow speed. SMV signs are a triangular bright orange with reflective red trim for both easy day and night visibility. Make sure the SMV sign is clean and visible from the rear of the unit before transporting the tractor and implement on a public roadway. Replace the SMV emblem if faded, damaged, or no longer reflective. *OPS-U- 0020str*



Make sure that all tractor flashing warning lights, headlights, and brake/tail lights are functioning properly before proceeding onto public roads. While newer model tractors have plenty of lighting to provide warning signals and operating lighting, most older models are only equipped with operating lights. Consult an authorized tractor dealer for lighting kits and modifications available to upgrade the lighting on older tractor models. *OPS-U- 0021str*



When operating on public roads, have consideration for other road users. Pull to the side of the road occasionally to allow all following traffic to pass. Do not exceed the legal speed limit set in your country for agricultural tractors. Always stay alert when transporting the tractor and implement on public roads. Use caution and reduce speed if other vehicles or pedestrians are in the area.

Reduce speed before turning or applying the brakes. Ensure that both brake pedals are locked together when operating on public roads. *OPS-U-0023 str*

16.2 Hauling the Tractor and Implement

Before transporting a loaded tractor and implement, measure the height and width dimensions and gross weight of the complete loaded unit. Ensure that the load will be in compliance with the legal limits set for the areas that will be traveled through. OPS-U- 0024str

Use adequately sized and rated trailers and equipment to transport the tractor and implement. Consult an authorized dealer to determine the proper equipment required. Using adequately sized chains, heavy duty straps, cables and/or binders, securely tie down both the front and rear of the tractor utilizing the proper tie down locations as specified by the tractor manufacturer. *OPS-U- 0025 str*

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

MAINTENANCE

BLADE MOUNTING BOLTS

The two sides of the blade are mounted with four bolts and center-lock distorted-thread locknuts. These four bolts should be loosely tightened with a 1/16" gap. This gap allows the blade to move up and down.



PROPER TORQUE FOR FASTENERS

The chart lists the correct tightening torque for fasteners. When bolts are to be tightened or replaced, refer to this chart to determine the grade of bolts and the proper torque except when specific torque values are assigned in manual text.


Recommended Torque in Foot Pounds Unless Otherwise Stated in the Manual*

NOTE: These values apply to fasteners as received from supplier, dry or when lubricated with normal engine oil. They do not apply if special graphited or molydisulphide greases or other extreme pressure lubricants are used. This applies to both UNF fine and UNC coarse threads.

To keep your implement running efficiently and safely, read your manual thoroughly and follow these directions and the Safety Messages in this Manual. The Table of Contents clearly identifies each section where you can easily find the information you need.

The OCCUPATIONAL SAFETY AND HEALTH ACT (1928.51 Subpart C) makes these minimum safety requirements of tractor operators:

REQUIRED OF THE OWNER:

- 1. Provide a Roll-Over-Protective Structure that meets the requirements of this Standard; and
- 2. Provide Seat belts that meet the requirements of this paragraph of this Standard and SAE J4C; and
- 3. Ensure that each employee uses such Seat belt while the tractor is moving; and
- 4. Ensure that each employee tightens the Seat belt sufficiently to confine the employee to the protected area provided by the ROPS.

REQUIRED OF THE OPERATOR:

- 1. Securely fasten seat belt if the tractor has a ROPS.
- 2. Where possible, avoid operating the tractor near ditches, embankments, and holes.
- 3. Reduce speed when turning, crossing slopes, and on rough, slick, or muddy surfaces.
- 4. Stay off slopes too steep for safe operation.
- 5. Watch where you are going especially at row ends, on roads, and around trees.
- 6. Do not permit others to ride.
- 7. Operate the tractor smoothly no jerky turns, starts, or stops.
- 8. Hitch only to the drawbar and hitch points recommended by the tractor manufacturer.
- 9. When the tractor is stopped, set brakes securely and use park lock, if available.
 - **X** Keep children away from danger all day, every day...
 - **X** Equip tractors with rollover protection (ROPS) and keep all machinery guards in place...
 - **X** Please work, drive, play and live each day with care and concern for your safety and that of your family and fellow citizens.



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
